



Psittacosis

What is Psittacosis?

Psittacosis is an infectious disease caused by *Chlamydia psittaci*, a bacteria that normally infects birds.

Signs and Symptoms

In most people, symptoms develops within 5-14 days after exposure. Symptoms include:

- Fever and chills
- Headache
- Muscle Ache
- Dry Cough

Infection can also lead to pneumonia, and rarely death

Transmission (How it spreads)

The most common means of infection is via inhalation of dust from dried bird urine, feces, and respiratory secretions. This usually occurs when handling or cleaning a bird/bird cage

Diagnosis and Treatment

Psittacosis is difficult to diagnose, but blood tests and sputum swabs are available to detect the bacteria in the body

Antibiotics are used for treatment

Prevention:

If purchasing a pet bird, do so from a well-known pet store.

If you own a pet bird or poultry, follow good precautions when handling and cleaning birds and their cages

Who's At Risk?

High risk groups include:

- Those who own and/or handle pet birds or poultry
- Veterinarians
